January is National Mentoring Month. In this article you will read about the Foothills Mentor Program and be introduced to some of our amazing mentors. Mentoring is foundational to the non-traditional Foothills model of high school completion. While Foothills does not have football teams, cafeterias, pep rallies, or proms, one thing that we do have that is unique and different than the typical comprehensive high school experience is that each Foothills student is matched with a paid mentor. Decades of research have shown that mentoring is one key to positive youth mental health outcomes, engagement in school, and post-secondary success. Foothills investment in its mentor program has existed since the inception of the school. Foothills mentors come from far and wide across the communities where Foothills sites are located. Some mentors are retired educators, while others are community members who may work in the local bank or fire department. Some mentors have even been Foothills students themselves in the past—they know what it takes to motivate and encourage a Foothills student!



Bill Russell, MENTOR national co-founder said "There is no such thing as other people's children." Foothills mentors take this to heart as they invest time, energy and care into the lives of their mentees.
