Title I and Foothills Regional High School

- Title I is a program that provides federal funds through the Georgia
 Department of Education to local educational agencies (LEAs) and public
 schools with high numbers or percentages of children in poverty to help
 ensure that all children meet challenging state academic content and student
 academic achievement standards.
- Foothills is a Schoolwide Title I school. The goal of the schoolwide Title I program is to improve the entire educational program in a Title I school, which would result in improving the academic achievement of ALL students, particularly the lowest-achieving students.



Goals and Commitments

- Schoolwide Goals:
 - Increase graduation rate.
 - Improve student performance on End of Course assessments.
- Supports in Place to Help my child:
 - Extra teachers and tutors
 - Mentors

In order to meet our goals, we must:

- Conduct a comprehensive needs assessment.
- Identify and commit to our goals and to strategies that address identified needs.
- Conduct an annual evaluation of the effectiveness of the schoolwide program and revise the plan annually or as necessary.
- Partner and engage with families to increase the likelihood of student success.

Family Engagement & School Compact

- Family Engagement means the participation of parents and family members in regular, two-way, and meaningful communication involving student academic learning and other school activities.

Comprehensive Support and Improvement

- Foothills has been identified as a school in need of Comprehensive Support and Improvement (CSI) due to graduation rate.
- The Georgia Department of Education designated schools (Title I or non-Title I) as CSI if they have a four-year adjusted cohort graduation rate less than or equal to 67%.
- Foothills has a graduation rate below 67% due to our vision, which is to strive to be an accessible high-quality high school option that is flexible and responsive to the needs of the People of Georgia and its communities.
- Funds received are used to hire school improvement facilitators to help stay focused on the goals of the school, to increase student performance on End of Course assessments, which will increase our graduation rate.

Title I Funds & Family Engagement Programs

How does Foothills spend the money it receives?

- Foothills consolidates Title I money with state and local dollars which provides greater flexibility in how the funds can be used.
- Funds are used to hire additional credentialed teachers and tutors to help support those students who need extra help to master standards and do well on End-of-Course tests.

Family Engagement Programs

- Districts receiving more than \$500,000 in Title I funds must reserve 1% of those funds to implement family engagement programs.
- Based on feedback from parents, these funds will be used to host family engagement events at the district level and at individual Foothills sites.
- Parents will be asked to share ideas on how these funds should be spent next school year (2024-2025) at the spring planning meetings and on surveys.

Don't let your teen get caught in a class-skipping spiral

Your teen was up late last night and wants to sleep in. But missing just one or two classes can start a downward spiral that can lead to poor grades and even dropping out. Attendance matters. Remind your teen that no employer will let employees show up only when they feel like it. Emphasize that school is your teen's job. Then, limit your teen's late-night work hours to the weekend, and provide a loud alarm clock.

Your teen was up late last night, and this morning is pleading. "Can't I sleep in just this once?"

You don't want a fight. And you find yourself wondering whether it really matters if your student participates in every class every day.



It does matter. It is important for your teen to attend and take part in classes. The association between poor attendance and lower academic achievement has been demonstrated in every state in the U.S. Missing just one or two sessions of a class can start a downward spiral.

What can you do to keep your teen on track? Here are some tips:

- Limit your teen's late-night job hours to the weekend. School is your student's most important job.
- Make sure your teen has an alarm clock with a loud alarm.
- Stress to your teen why it is important to be in every class on time. No future employer will let your teen just show up when it feels good.
- Work with the school if your teen is facing issues that prevent regular attendance. Your teen's counselor may be able to help your student overcome them.
